2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

- 1) Admission is strictly on the basis of all rules & regulation, seat reservation policy of affiliated University and government. All information is properly communicated to the stakeholders through college website, and notice board of the college.
- 2) College provides prospectus at the time of admission of the students stating the information about fees structure, student support, and Academic calendar.
- 3) To teach the students in a more illustrative and understandable way, teachers use LCD projector for screening films relevant to their text in the class room. All departments organise students' seminars where they are encouraged to present papers on topics of their choice. Group discussion among students on different subject matters are also held..
- 4) To improve the Class Teaching method with Chalk and Board system, the Academic Committee suggested improving the tools of teaching within the Class Room. Thus the G.B. decided to refit Green Board, White Board and Notice Board for the benefit of the Students and the process of learning by utilizing the Grant given by the UGC during XI Plan Period.
- 5) The Teacher-in-Charge in order enhance teaching quality encouraged the faculty members to participate in orientation, refresher courses, seminar etc .
- 6) Number of special lectures by eminent professors from reputed Universities and Institution on various topics highlighting the fundamentals and frontiers in the subjects is arranged by the departments.
- 7) Educational excursions in all Departments are organised annually.
- 8) All departments conduct two exams. (Midterm & Test).Results are published within three weeks. All departments conduct unit tests and the evaluated papers are shown to the students and shortcomings in their answers scripts are discussed.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

As the College follows the Syllabus and Curriculum of Calcutta University there is little scope of internal curricular designing. However every department has its own academic calendar to run and complete the syllabus.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

1. The faculties of each department meet at the beginning of each academic session for term-wise allocation of syllabus assignments, contents, fix dates for the term-end tests and prepare the academic calendar of that session.
2. The teachers organise departmental meetings on regular basis to evaluate the degree of progress made by the students and the difficulties encountered by the students in comprehending the subject matter. Accordingly the teachers plan their future course of teaching and curriculum delivery.
3. The departments organize students' seminars, group discussion, intra and inter-departmental quiz contests etc. to improve the comprehending and analytical power of the students in the respective subject.
4. Technology enabled Teaching Learning process practised in college. LCD projectors and overhead projectors are used for teaching occasionally.
5. Student seminars and paper presentation by the students are encouraged in the classes.
6. Field study and Project work carried out by Commerce Geography and Journalism departments of the College.

College provides facility of institutional membership of British Council Library to the college staff. To teach the students in a more illustrative and understandable way, teachers use LCD projector for screening films relevant to their text in the class room.

SWOT ANALYSIS:

STRENGTH : The chief strength of this Institution is the cohesive spirit of all stakeholders in building the institution and steering it in the right direction. The college has well qualified, sincere and dedicated faculty, motivated and efficient non-teaching staff as well as responsive and meritorious students from diverse socio-economic background. A variety of undergraduate courses are offered by this institution. Effective delivery of curriculum is ensured through regular classes, systematic evaluation and remedial classes for the backward and slow learners. The student support mechanism of the college includes medical check-up, regular physical training, career counselling and financial assistance through Students' Aid-Fund Scheme. The convenient location of the institution with good communication network enables the students from different parts of the city and its suburbs to reach the college. The students are exposed to a multi-lingual and multi-cultural environment which enables them to develop as good and tolerant citizens of a diverse India.

WEAKNESS : Due to the lack of availability of adequate space the expansion of the college cannot proceed at a desirable pace. The adjacent land is illegally occupied by members of the local community. Due to the institutional policy of maximum access, the college has a high proportion of students from the neighbouring community most of whom happen to be 1st generation learners. The students of this community (coming primarily from Urdu/Hindi medium educational institutions) face a genuine difficulty in writing the subject matter in the University prescribed medium i.e. English/ Bengali. So the percentage of success of the students of this college is comparatively low.

OPPORTUNITIES: The College has made persistent attempts in the direction of the expansion of the college building through acquisition of the land adjacent to the college with the aim of introducing the science degree course and some other departments.

THREAT : Poor attendance is a major threat. Since most of the students come from poor economic background, they are often engaged in part-time jobs. Secondly students lack good communication skill in English or Bengali—the medium of instruction and evaluation prescribed by the University of Calcutta. Finally lack of space due to illegal acquisition of the land hinders the all round development of the college.

1. Installation of CCTV Camera in College Premises.
2. To facilitate each Department with necessary equipment for effective implementation of the teaching-learning process.
3. To Fill up the vacant post of the Principal , Assistant Professors and Head Clerk.
4. To expedite the process of acquisition of the adjacent land for the construction of a new building through the newly constituted Building Sub-committee.
5. Further computerization of office and Library.
6. To continue the remedial classes for the weaker students.

Annexure III

Best Practices I : Organisation of Youth Parliament by the students of the college.

Goals : The college encourages its students to organize Youth Parliament with the following objectives -

- i) To create interest among the students about Parliamentary democracy and the Law- making procedure in the Union and state legislatures.
- ii) To enable the students of the social sciences especially those of political science understand the proceeding of the Parliament.



The context: The vision of this college has been “Tamoso Ma Jyotirgamaya” which articulates the dedication of this college to wisdom. Just as the remedy for darkness is light the only remedy for ignorance is knowledge. With this objective in mind, every effort is made by the college to enable the students to explore the positive aspect of the politics. The truth that politics doesn't always mean regressive and destructive practices but also progressive and constructive planning and implementation can be inculcated in the young minds by staging successful Youth Parliament. Staging of Youth Parliament enables the teachers to make the students realize the fact that true politics stands for the upliftment and betterment of human society.

The Practice: The teachers belonging to the Department of Political Science prepare the script of Youth Parliament on the basis of newspaper reports, articles, and editorials. For this, the teachers have to attend a workshop on Youth Parliament organized by the Ministry of Parliamentary Affairs of the Government of West Bengal legislative Assembly. After that they select the characters from among the students to stage the drama. Continuous rehearsals are done every day to prepare the students for the final performance. A date is provided by the Ministry of Parliamentary Affairs on which the Youth Parliament is staged in the college. In the year 2011-12, the students of this college who performed Youth Parliament were chosen for the district-level competition.

Evidence of Success: The spontaneous participation of the students, their skill in debating, arguing, and the lucid and fluent delivery of the dialogue prove that they take real interest in staging Youth Parliament. Not only the students who participate, but also those who appear as audience now seem to be more involved in parliamentary politics and democratic governmental practices.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- 1) Lack of adequate time for rigorous practice and rehearsal for staging Youth Parliament due to hectic academic schedule.
- 2) Lack of proper auditorium for staging Youth Parliament.

Resources Required: Allotment of special financial grant for organizing Youth Parliament.



Best practice II:

Extension Activities of Social Relevance Organized by Kidderpore College NSS Unit I and II

Goal: The aim of all the extension activities is to inspire and motivate young learners towards the ideals of social welfare service, philanthropy, and the task of man-making. The aim of this college is not just to impart curriculum-based training, but to sensitize the students towards the moral responsibility to address the contemporary socio-economic problems which continue to imperil our society and the nation.

The Context: The locality of the college is such which confronts the problems of child labour, deprivation of the female children from primary and secondary education, lack of awareness regarding personal as well as community hygiene, and illiteracy of the adult population. Keeping these basic problems in mind, the National Service Scheme (NSS) units I and II of this college organized extension activities so as to fulfill the following objective of- sufficiently addressing the poverty-related issues, most notably child labour, illiteracy, lack of consciousness regarding personal and community hygiene of urban slums especially of neighbouring community.

The Practice: There are two NSS units in the college- one for boys and another for girls to organize extension activities. The various programmes conducted by the NSS units in 2011-12 were the following-

- i. A 7-day special camp and awareness programme at Iqbalpur Crossing was organized on
a) education for girl child, b) prevention of child labour, c) prevention of environmental pollution.
- ii. An awareness programme was organized on
a) Save the Girl Child, b) General Health Care, c) Education for All.
- iii. An awareness programme on leprosy was organized in collaboration with Gandhi memorial leprosy Foundation.

Evidence of Success: There is noticeable change in the outlook of the girls students. They appear to be more involved in the educational upliftment of the female folk. The male students also showed remarkable interest in arousing general consciousness regarding personal and community hygiene and health care.

Problems Encountered and resources Required: There are infrastructural and financial constraints upon organizing large scale in-house programmes to address large audience groups as part of extension programmes.

Resources Required: Institutional collaboration with other colleges/ civic bodies/ welfare groups etc. has to be activated for enhancing the NSS related activities.
