6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

The vision statement Tamaso ma jyotirgamaya articulates the dedication of the College to wisdom. Just as the remedy for darkness is light the remedy for ignorance is knowledge. Kidderpore College aims to promote the students from darkness to light through the realm of knowledge.

Kidderpore college basically deals with first generation learners who happen to belong to a poor economic background. It is therefore a magnificent task to create a minimal academic awareness among them to enable them to make the best use of the mainstream career opportunities. However the College does not remain confined to imparting merely syllabus-based knowledge but to enrich and enable them to serve the nation as better citizens.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

This is outside the purview of the college. It is under the authority of the affiliating university.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- 1.Remedial coaching classes are arranged for the weak students who need special attention.
- 2.Tutorial classes are arranged for advanced students where they get impetus for creative thinking and analytical, rational, liberal and intellectual presentation of their thoughts.

- Revised 3.The students are encouraged to prepare projects on topics related to their subject.
 - 4. They are taken to educational tours for the enrichment of their knowledge.
 - 5. They are encouraged to present papers in student seminars, group discussions and debates.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Apart from the annual examinations Mid-term test, Selection test, and Unit Test have been introduced to evaluate students' performance. Beside this, student seminars are organised periodically where they are asked to present papers.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- 1. The IQAC encourages the teachers to take up Minor research projects under UGC as well as to avail of the Faculty Improvement Programme of UGC to complete their dissertations within the stipulated time.
- 1. The IQAC encourages the Seminar subcommittee to organise teachers seminars at regular intervals to enrich the analytical and research-oriented thinking of the teachers.
- 3. The College Library has been improvised with e-books and e-journals of unimpeachable quality to facilitate the research work of the teachers.

The library has subscribed to the $N-LIST\ e-journal\ consortium\ of\ INFLIBNET$ to enable the teachers to access more than $6000\ e-journal\ and\ 97000\ e-books$

The library offers around 29000 text and reference books, apart from periodicals, CDs and DVDs.

It also offers institutional as well as online membership of the British Council Library.

It provides free reading room, Book Bank and borrowing facility to the students.

Efforts are initiated to convert room no 9 of the College into an ICT-enabled smart room.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The Human resource of the College is cultivated in a rational and Democratic fashion. The teachers are encouraged to enroll in the Faculty Development Programmes (OPs and RCs) for the enhancement of their teaching quality. The members of the non-teaching staff also get ample opportunity to develop their skills through various training programmes .Recently the IQAC has advised the College management to impart computer literacy training to the interested members of the non-teaching staff. There are multiple subcommittees to cater to the academic, administrative and research needs of the College. Above all using the healthy alliance of the teaching and non-teaching staff the IQAC endeavours to exploit every possible expertise of the College to turn the Institution into an ideal centre of higher education.

SWOT ANALYSIS:

STRENGTH: The chief strength of this Institution is the cohesive spirit of all stakeholders in building the institution and steering it in the right direction. The college has well qualified, sincere and dedicated faculty, motivated and efficient non-teaching staff as well as responsive and meritorious students from diverse socio-economic background. A variety of undergraduate courses are offered by this institution. Effective delivery of curriculum is ensured through regular classes, systematic evaluation and remedial classes for the backward and slow learners. The student support mechanism of the college includes medical check-up, regular physical training, career counselling and financial assistance through Students' Aid-Fund Scheme. The convenient location of the institution with good communication network enables the students from different parts of the city and its suburbs to reach the college on time. The students are exposed to a multi-lingual and multi-cultural environment which enables them to develop as good and tolerant citizens of a diverse India.

WEAKNESS: Due to the lack of availability of adequate space the expansion of the college cannot proceed at a desirable pace. The adjacent land is illegally occupied by members of the local community. Due to the institutional policy of maximum access, the college has a high proportion of students from the neighbouring community most of whom happen to be first-generation learners. The students of this community (coming primarily from Urdu/Hindi medium educational institutions) face a genuine difficulty in writing the subject matter in the University prescribed medium i.e. English/ Bengali. So the percentage of success of the students of this college is comparatively low.

OPPORTUNITIES: The College has made persistent attempts in the direction of the expansion of the college building through acquisition of the land adjacent to the college with the aim of introducing the science degree course and some other departments.

Any Two Best Practices

Best Practice I - Sustained emphasis on the annual publication of Wall Magazine by the students of each department.

➤ Goals :

The College encourages the students of all the sixteen departments to publish annual wall magazine with the following objectives –

• To explore and bring to light the talent potential of each student and to provide an ambience for creative expression.

- To promote awareness among the students about the contemporary burning issues of social, political and economic relevance.
- To expose the students to new ideas for future research and development.
- To develop reading, writing and analytical skills.

➤ The Context :

The vision of our College has been *Tamoso Ma Jotirgamaya* which articulates the College dedication to wisdom. Ignorance like darkness obscures the understanding. Just as the remedy for darkness is light, the only remedy for ignorance is knowledge. With this objective in mind, every effort has been made by our College to tap the hidden potential in the students and inculcate good reading and writing habits. With this objective in mind, the College encourages the students of every department to choose any issue of contemporary relevance, extensively read the materials related to this issue and prepare a write – up, attaching related pictures which is then put up on the walls of the corridors as wall magazines.

➤ The Practice :

- The students of every department choose a particular issue which is of contemporary relevance in politics, society, economy and discuss the issue with the teachers of the respective departments. For example in 2015: (1) the students of the English department chose to prepare wall magazine on the 19th century English Novelists; (2) the students of Bengali department chose to work on the short stories of Upendrakishore Roychowdhury; (3) The students of Urdu department selected the topic "Origin of Urdu language in India"; (4) Those of the department of Political Science selected the issue of "The International Refugee Crisis"; (5) Those of Commerce department decided to work on "The Formation of companies under the Companies Act, 2013", and so on.
- After selecting their topic, they consult the teachers of their departments, who provide them with a list of references to go through and prepare the write up.
- After preparing their writing material they once again come up to the respective teacher who goes through their written article and suggests necessary amendments required.
- The College provides a certain sum of money for purchasing the required stationeries needed for preparing the wall magazine.
- On the day of final preparation of the wall magazine, the teacher closely supervises the work of the students to enable them to put up a brilliant presentation.
- Finally, after the wall magazine is ready, it is put up in the cages earmarked for respective departments on the walls of the corridor of the first floor, adjacent to the Teachers' reading room and the Principal's Chamber.
- A photograph of the teacher along with the students putting up the wall magazine is taken and enclosed in the College prospectus.
- The teacher also arranges some refreshment for the students as a mark of recognition of their dedicated and sincere efforts.

Evidence of Success:

The success is reflected in the sincere efforts made by the students to prepare their departmental wall magazines as well as the genuinely intelligent and thought provoking write – ups with the appropriately chosen pictures which attract the attention of all.

> Problems encountered and resources required.

The most significant problem encountered in this regard is the declining reading habit of the students, their apathy towards reading newspapers, editorials in the newspapers and growing inclination towards internet. While enabling the students to prepare their wall magazines, it has been found that they prefer to consult ready materials available on the internet, rather than preparing notes after rigorously going through the articles published in renowned journals and periodicals. Moreover, since majority of the

students hail from Urdu and Hindi medium schooling background, they fail to comprehend the articles from well – read books and journals. So in most of the cases the teachers have to come to their rescue by making them understand the materials available in the books, journals and English newspapers. Sometimes the teachers also have to provide them with simplified versions of the reading materials. More financial resources are required to replace the cages of some of the departments for the display of wall magazines. The old and shabby ones immediately need to be replaced by new ones.

Title of the Practice: Extension Activities of Social Relevance.

1> Goal: The aim of the practice is to inspire and motivate young learners towards ideals of social welfare service, philanthropy, and the task of man – making. The aim of this College is not just to impart curriculum – based training but to sensitize the students towards the moral responsibility to address the contemporary socio – economic problems which continue to imperil our society and the nation.

<u>2≻ The Context</u>: The student – clientele of this College comprises of a cross – section of the city's cosmopolitan population and a significant section of the students belong to the less privileged groups. Keeping these twin factors in mind, the extension activities of the College are designed so as to fulfill the following objectives –

- 1) To sufficiently address the poverty related issues, most notably child labour, illiteracy, lack of consciousness regarding personal and community hygiene of urban slums especially of neighbourhood community.
- 2) To spread consciousness among the students about women's rights, sensitize them towards the need to resist gender oriented inequalities and vulnerabilities and prevent all forms of atrocities against women.
- 3) To carry out persistent campaigns against social evils like use of alcohol, drugs and tobacco which imperil our society and cause life-threatening diseases like cancer etc.
- 4) The Practice: There are two NSS units in the College one for boys and another for girls to promote awareness among the students about the relevant contemporary socio economic issues. There is also the Women's Forum to undertake extension and outreach programmes. The NSS units as well as the Women's Forum hold meetings convened by the programme officers and the Women's Forum Convener, chaired by the Principal / Teacher In Charge and attended by the members of both the sub-committiees. For organizing these extension programmes, the NSS units as well as the Women's Forum take the assistance of NGO 'SWAYAM'. In the session 2015-16 the following programmes were conducted by the NSS units of the college:
 - The NSS Units I and II of the College organized a *Sit and Draw Competition* for the local slum children and a *free Health check-up camp* for the downtrodden and the underprivileged people on 23.07.15 in the college premises.
 - They organized a Cancer Awareness Programme in collaboration with K.K Memorial Cancer Research Institute in the College. Dr Ramdas Chatterjee the eminent Cancer specialist delivered an audio-visual lecture on 2.02.2016 to raise consciousness regarding the disease.
 - Again in the same year the NSS units organized an awareness programme entitled *Save The Girl Child* to create consciousness regarding the rights of the girl children on 16.02.2016.

The Women's Forum also organizes programmes from time to time to arouse consciousness regarding Women's rights.

- On the sixth day of December, every year the Women's Forum organizes an awareness programme regarding communal harmony and women's rights. On 06.12.2015 the Women's Forum organized a workshop on the theme "Communal Riots and their adverse impact on the safety and security of women" in collaboration with the NGO 'SWAYAM'.
- 5) On 27.09.2015 Women's Forum organized an awareness programme concerning the issue *Consumption of Alcohol By men and its Evil Impact on Women*.in collaboration with the NGO SWAYAM.

Evidence of Success: There is a noticeable change in the outlook of the girl students. They now appear to be more involved in the extension activities related to the upliftment and betterment of the position of women in the society. The students who regularly participate in the NSS activities seem to have become more responsive towards the contemporary socio – economic problems which intend to harm our society. Moreover the efforts made by the NSS units and the Women's Forum have enabled the students of this College to tackle their emotional and family related problems more rationally than before and rise above these problems to carve out their individual identity.

7) Problems encountered and Resources required –

- i) The problems encountered are as follow
 - a) Scarcity of financial resources and adequate time due to academic schedule create obstacles in the path of wide ranging and comprehensive social welfare services.
 - b) There is infrastructural constraint involved in organizing large scale in-house programmes to address larger audience groups as part of extension programmes.
- ii) The resources required are as follow
 - a) Allotment of special financial grant for expanding the ambit of activities rendered.
- b) There is a need to further activate institutional collaboration with other Colleges / civic bodies, welfare groups etc. for enhancing the NSS and Women's Forum related activities.
