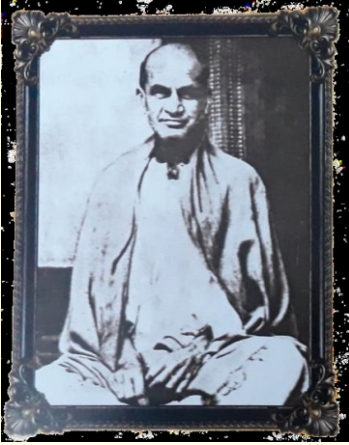

Honorable Late Jitendranath Bandyopadhyay was born in Kolkata on the 1st of March, 1902. He did his post-graduation in Physics from the University of Calcutta. Having joined as a teacher at the Kidderpore Academy, he went on to become the Headmaster of the institution.

Sri Bandyopadhyay was instrumental in bringing about comprehensive development in the institution. He was a strict disciplinarian and had a sharp sense of punctuality but, interestingly, was a man who never wore a watch. He would reach school quite early in the morning and work late in the evening. Although a student of science, he nurtured an interest in literature and linguistics too. He wrote two plays, 'Premer Thaur' and 'Shyamsundar', which were staged by his students.

Kidderpore College has always been one of the finest contributors to higher education since its commencement. The college bears testimony to his unconditional and dedicated perseverance for the upliftment of the people of Kidderpore and the neighbouring areas. Being determined to achieve his mission, he doggedly worked to overcome all odds that came his way. Sri Jitendranath Bandyopadhyay acted as the Rector of this college between 1966 and 1971. He left this mortal world on the 24th of August, 1979. We retrospect the architect of our college with reverence.



## Kidderpore College: A Legacy

Kidderpore College was founded in 1966 after getting its affiliation from the University of Calcutta. At the outset, it would be worthwhile to look at the history of the College in order to comprehend the contribution of the educated elite of the locality in founding a seat of higher education.

In the 1960's, the legacy of the nationalist movement was still alive and as a part of social development, a rising need for education culminated in the establishment of Kidderpore Academy in 1904 as a National School, with Late Mr. Jitendranath Bandyopadhyay as its Head Master. Kidderpore College was his brainchild. With the support of the local enthusiasts the College was founded and it started functioning in the extended building of Kidderpore Academy from October 1, 1966.

Late Mr. Satyanarayan Ghosal, member of the family of the renowned Gokul Ghosal, Dr. Ajit Mukherjee, Member of the Bankulia House and Late Mr. Ramesh Chandra Pal extended financial support for the College building. In the early 1970s some rooms on the ground and the first floor were completed. However, classes continued to be held in the annexe of the Academy building which also housed the library, office and the Principal's Chamber. Kidderpore, also known as Kabirtirtha is a seat of cultural heritage. It has produced a number of scholars and poets. To continue with that legacy and promote education among the local youth, a number of scholarships were offered to the successful students in the name of these families of repute. The College is still a beneficiary of the benevolence of the local people.

This initiative of the founders of the College was strengthened by the gradual expansion of state support in the social sector, particularly education, in the late 1970s and early 1980s. Free school education up to the Higher Secondary level created opportunity for a large section of the poor and the marginalized to enter the orbit of higher education. The number of subjects increased, and with it increased the infrastructural facilities, the number of teachers and students. The Honours courses were introduced in a number of subjects in the late 1970s. With the introduction of Urdu, a large number of students got enrolled in the College.

The College is vibrant with extra-curricular activities throughout the year. The NCC and the NSS Cells add colour to the students' achievements and open new vistas in their pursuit of careers after graduation. Our students emerged National Champions in Table Tennis, Boxing, Taekwondo. Students of the Hindi Department are often awarded the Best Performer's Prize in Intercollege Drama Competition. The College participates regularly in the Intercollege Youth Parliament Competition at the District and the State levels and wins awards. The students also take part in Intercollege Competitions in Creative Writing and Poster Writing.

The first Indian tricolour in green, yellow, and red also came from Calcutta. On August 7, 1906, at Parsi Bagan (Sadhana Sarkar Udyan today), Bhupendranath Basu handed the flag to nationalist leader Surendranath Banerjee, who hoisted it to the accompaniment of 101 explosives going off.

Honours students can borrow 3 books for 7 days and General students are entitled to get 2 books for 7 days. Indian flag - 1931

Finally in 1931, the Congress decided that a Flag Committee was needed to finalise a flag acceptable to all. As far as can be ascertained, in an article titled 'The National Flag' published in Modern Review in June 1931, Professor Suniti Kumar Chatterji cautioned that any explanation of the colours of the national flag as symbolic of Hindus, Muslims, Christians or any other community should be regarded as "pernicious and anti-national". He also pointed out that red, white, and green already featured in the flags of at least four countries: Persia, Italy, Bulgaria, and Mexico. To avoid confusion, he suggested vertical bands of red, green, and ochre or saffron, with a three- or four-spoked wheel (or four- or eight-petalled white lotus) in the central field.



## Facilities Available to the Students

### **Audio - Visual Room:**

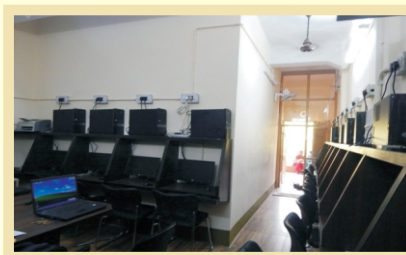
The College offers, among other facilities, an air conditioned e-classroom with ICT based amenities like overhead and LCD projectors, screen, podium with good sound system, computers with Internet etc.

### **Seminar, Quiz and Debate :**

The College maintains an atmosphere conducive to healthy educational practices. Interactive instructional techniques like focused group discussions, projects, National Seminars/ Conferences/ Workshops, invited talks on various fields of research, subject based quiz and debate are held on a regular basis which undoubtedly offer opportunities for interactive, collaborative and independent learning practices.

### **College Computer Centre:**

To enhance the employability of the learners and to equip them better for jobs in the various expanding sectors, the College has a well-equipped computer centre with 27 desktop computers which help to impart intense computer application training.



### **Media Lab:**

The Journalism and Mass Communication Department is endowed with an audio-visual media lab which enables the practical training of the students. The Media Lab contains all modern page making and editing softwares as well as television and movie cameras and other facilities for an in-depth understanding of the subject.

### **UGC HEPSN Scheme under XII Plan:**

Under the UGC Scheme of Higher Education of Persons with Special Needs (HEPSN), the College provides various educational implements to the students who have special needs due to their sensory/ physical / neurological impairments.



### **Career Counseling Cell:**

The College also avails of certain UGC Schemes to prepare the students for different entrance examinations necessary for professional courses and jobs. Different professional agencies are invited so that the students get access to first hand information of the things to come. A good number of students have secured an effective training and



have been recruited by Metlife, IBM, Frankfin George Telegraph Orion Edu Tech Pvt. Ltd. etc.

### **Remedial Coaching:**

Special remedial classes, without an additional fee, are offered to SC/ST/OBC students and students belonging to minority categories who are unable to manage their educational needs through regular classes. Students belonging to the General category can also participate in such classes subject to the consideration of the College authority.

This year our college has opened a free coaching centre for children up to class 5, with the name "Sahapathi".

The aim is to extend our hand towards community development and upliftment of poor children living in slums of the locality.

### **UGC Sponsored Minority Students' Coaching for Competitive Examinations:**

The College offers opportunities not only to its own students but also to the local youth in relation to their preparation for competitive examinations like SSC, PSC, WBCS, UPSC etc.

Different organizations like The Camellia Institute of Management, IJIT, Institute of Chartered Accountants of India, and Institute of Cost Accountants of India have organised career counselling programmes for the above purpose.

### **Course in Communicative English:**

The College also provides a course in Communicative English for the students to impart skill in this language.

### **Study Tour:**

Various Departments arrange field tours and excursions for their respective students to enrich their practical knowledge and to expand their horizon of thought.

### **Students' Aid Fund:**

The Students' Aid Fund provides financial assistance to the economically backward students when they appear for their University Examinations. The recommendation is based mainly on merit, attendance, annual income of parents, and performance in sports or cultural activities.

### **Students' Health Home Clinic:**

This College has introduced Regional Health Home Clinic to cater to the medical needs of not only its own students, but also those from neighbouring schools and colleges. The patients are charged only Rs. 10/- per head, inclusive of medicines. In case of an emergency, students are entitled to get admission in





the Students Health Home of Yuva Kendra.

**Students' Common Room (Separately for Boys and Girls):**

The College has separate common rooms for boys and girls with adequate number of for girls toilets.

**Canteen:**

The College canteen provides nutritious food for students at a reasonable price.

**Multigym:**

The College keeps the physical health of the students in mind and has, accordingly, provided a Multigym for both boys and girls at a moderate fee.

**Co-curricular Activities:**

**Sports:**

Apart from academic involvement in the classroom, participation in College sports is deemed essential for the students. Both the common rooms have ample facilities for indoor games. The Students' Union, under the guidance of the Professor - in - Charge (Sports) and the Union Games Secretary, creates sports teams to participate in both inter and intra college tournaments organized by the University of Calcutta and the Sports Directorate of West Bengal. Members of the sports team participate in Football, Cricket and Athletics. The students with District, State and National level sports certificates get special aid and full free studentship.



**Bhasha Divas:**

The College celebrates Bhasha Divas every year on the 21st of February. Students participate in the programme while they empathize whole-heartedly with the cause that rocked Bangladesh in 1952.

**Students' Union:**

The Students' union of the college under the leadership of the General Secretary cooperates with the college administration and the teachers in understanding and catering to the diverse needs of the students. The Union respects the teachers and abides by the decisions taken by the College authority.

**Cultural Competition and Annual Social Functions:**

A variety of academic and cultural programmes are organised by the College throughout the year like Youth Parliament, Recitation, Debate, Drama, Quiz, Extempore and Music Competition. The Annual Social is held in winter every year.



### **Other Special Programmes:**

The College grants permission for the arrangement of special occasions like Saraswati Puja, Teachers' Day, Republic Day, Milad - Un Nabi for promoting social harmony and integration.

### **NSS:**

The College is proud to have an active NSS unit and the entire team works throughout the year under the guidance of the Programme officer. It forms an integral part of the College curriculum and has units for both boys and girls. They exhibit their skills in various fields and organize programmes like literacy campaign, Blood Donation Camp, AIDS Awareness, Beautification, Plantation Programme, Cleanliness drive etc. to effect student leadership in social and community services in coordination with Women's Forum, the NCC and the Culture Club.



### **NCC:**

The NCC unit comprised of both male and female students, actively works for promoting discipline, helping students to get jobs, for strengthening civil defence and for various other welfare purposes. Each cadet is required to join the parade thrice a week.



### **Special Awards and Prizes:**

Students who fare well in preparatory tests, University Examinations, co-curricular activities like sports, drama, dance, debate, inter and intra college quiz are awarded by the College authority.

### **College Educational Tour:**

The College organizes a short tour for regular students every year under the guidance of some teachers and with the assistance of the Students' Union. Apart from this, every department arranges special study tours.

### **Sports Coaching:**

The College has been imparting rigorous sports training for the interested students since 2008 through a physical instructor. A good number of prizes and trophies have been won by the students in football, cricket and in other athletic sports..

### **Awareness Campaign:**

In association with NSS, NCC and the Women's Forum the College undertakes various awareness programmes for the socially deprived and vulnerable groups like the disabled, the specially abled and the female students. Students take an active role in these philanthropic endeavours.

**Guardians' Forum:**

The College has set up a Guardians' Forum which meets twice a year to discuss issues like attendance of students, their academic performance and their holistic development

**Alumni Association:**

The Alumni Association organizes an Annual Reunion and offers its suggestions for the betterment of the students and the future development of the College. The Association has been registered under the W.B. Act. under the patronage of Dr. Diba Hashmi, the then Teacher –in- Charge.

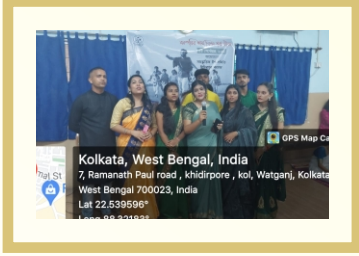
